PREFACE: HOW TO USE THIS MANUAL

The Degree Audit Reporting System, a.k.a. DARS, is a very useful tool for advising undergraduate majors. DARS is designed to list each requirement in the College of Letters & Science and in the individual departments and determine if a student has completed the requirements toward a bachelor's degree.

The College of Letters & Science has created wonderful worksheets that complement DARS. A student or advisor can utilize one of these worksheets for either a Bachelor of Science (page 18) or Bachelor of Arts degree (page 22) with a DARS and assess a student's progress. In the Department of Anthropology, we also have check-sheets for completion of both the regular and Honors in the Major programs (pages 16 & 17) that are designed to be used with DARS.

A DARS can be tricky to read, however. Although the sample I downloaded from the Registrar's Office Website (page 4) is in a portrait format ($8\frac{1}{2} \times 11$), DARS are really printed in a landscape format ($11 \times 8\frac{1}{2}$) and in multiple columns. The DARS that I provide for students are in the portrait format and look like an e-mail. Also, with the conversion from the old, non-Y2K compliant, computer program to the Integrated Student Information System (ISIS), many errors have crept into DARS reports. If an advisee comes to you with errors on the DARS, please contact me or the Campus DARS Coordinator, Bill Miller (phone and addresses on page 1) right away to have the problem(s) fixed.

This manual contains some background and general information about DARS (pp. 1-3), but the worksheets and check-sheets enclosed will be very useful as you advise undergraduates, and more copies are available in the department office. The final forms, Request For Exception in the Anthropology Major (page 26) and Honors in the Major (page 27), are for exactly what they state: exceptions to Departmental requirements. For example: a student can't gain admittance to Anthropology 105 or 107, but would like to use a higher level biology course, such as 408, in its place. In the line for the Anthro 105 or 107 requirement, one would write Anthro 408, 1999-2000 (year) Fall (sem). The student can complete the top section (name, classif. etc.), and the instructor for 408 (or the class being utilized for the exception) can sign on the Dept approval/date line. The form then comes to me for processing.

If you have any questions, please ask. A student's academic record can be very complex, but accuracy of these records is crucial and the student's responsibility. The department also publishes a booklet titled **Majoring in Anthropology** which is given to undergraduate majors to help answer many questions about requirements, careers, and other resources available. A copy of **Majoring in Anthropology** is provided as an appendix to this manual. Also, if you have any feedback on improvements for this manual, please let me know.

DEGREE AUDIT REPORTING SYSTEM

What is DARS?

The University of Wisconsin-Madison purchased DARS (Degree Audit Reporting System) in March, 1991 from Miami University in Oxford, Ohio. DARS is an automated degree audit system which produces a document called a DARS report (or DARS audit). In order to assist advisors and undergraduate students, DARS was purchased to enhance the advising process by providing an immediate analysis of how a student is progressing toward completion of a degree. Implementation of DARS is a campus-wide effort. Many people across campus have been instrumental in making DARS a reality at the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

What is a DARS Report?

A DARS report is a record of an undergraduate student's progress toward a degree or Certificate Program. It shows which requirements have been completed and which requirements still remain to be completed. DARS is the "document of record" in L&S, which means that it is the document used to certify a student's eligibility to graduate. Students must resolve any problems noted in the DARS report with their academic advisors and/or a member of the dean's staff to be eligible for graduation.

DARS reports are available to a student at any time in an undergraduate career. *Every L&S undergraduate student* has access to a DARS audit. L&S students can request a DARS in the L&S Student Academic Affairs Office in 70 Bascom Hall or on EASI. Anthropology majors can request a DARS from the Undergraduate Coordinator.

Because DARS uses the on-line student record, the course data should be up-to-date. If a student has touch-tone registered, the courses for which the student has registered can be included in the audit. This allows a student to verify how these courses fulfill requirements and make any changes, if necessary, before the semester begins. For students who are interested in pursuing other majors or degree programs, "what-if" DARS reports can be run to see how these courses might count toward other programs.

Major Declaration

Each student in the College of Letters and Science must file a Major Declaration form stating the desired major. Major declaration is begun in the departmental office housing a given major. A student may declare more than one major, and some majors may require an additional declaration of an option within a major. If a student decides not to complete a major previously declared, the student MUST go to the department and submit a Major Cancellation Form. Students are graduated on the basis of their declared majors, and no one will be graduated without declaring a major.

HOW TO REQUEST A DARS REPORT

For many students, DARS (Degree Audit Reporting System) reports are available on the World Wide Web through the EASI (Extended Access to Student Information) system. In EASI, a student may request a DARS report be sent electronically, provided the following conditions are met:

- 1. The student is enrolled in a DARS Open Program, which includes all L&S programs
- 2. The student has an active e-mail account. (To open an account go to a DoIT Info Lab)
- 3. The student's preferred e-mail address is correct on the EASI system.

A request for a DARS report before 4:30 p.m. should result in a report sent to the designated EASI e-mail address by the next morning. Please report problems encountered in using EASI to request a DARS report, or non-receipt of a DARS report by the next morning, by calling 608/262-5926 or e-mail dars@doit.wisc.edu.

Students unable to get a DARS report through the EASI system (for example, a major is not declared or a problem arose in using EASI) may request a DARS audit. DARS audits can be requested at the following locations for students enrolled in the "appropriate" programs:

DARS AS DOCUMENT OF RECORD

"Document of record" is the document which is used to certify completion of degree requirements. DARS is an automated Degree Audit Reporting System for undergraduates currently being adopted by various units schools and colleges within the University of Wisconsin-Madison. Prior to implementation of DARS, each undergraduate school and college used different documents of record to indicate completion of requirements.

Currently, the following schools and colleges use DARS as the document of record:

School of Business College of Engineering School of Family Resources and Consumer Sciences School of Nursing

DARS is currently document of record in the College of Letters and Science for college requirements in its Bachelor of Arts and Bachelor of Science programs. DARS is also document of record for major requirements in most departments.

As document of record, DARS audits will be retained beyond graduation in archival format according to University archival policies.
